

7TH GRADE ACTIVITY: WHAT JOBS NEED WHAT EDUCATION?

Welcome! This activity will provide you an opportunity to explore the three types of postsecondary education and a variety of careers.

Essential Question:

Why should I go to college? What type of education is needed for different types of careers?

Objectives:

- Describe three types of postsecondary education options.
- List jobs I can get with various types of degrees.

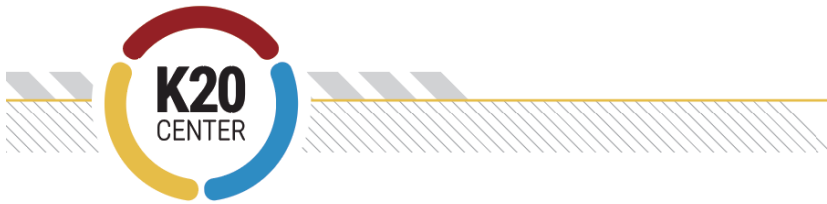
What is Postsecondary Education?

Postsecondary education (PSE) refers to education after high school. This could include college or career tech/vo-tech. Check your understanding of different types of colleges, universities, and degrees using the Test Your Career & College Knowledge activity by clicking [here](#). This activity will help you better understand your options after high school.

Matching Careers to Education

Review the careers listed in the Card Sort linked below. You may already know about some of these careers, but you may also learn about new careers. After you've learned more about the careers below, you'll try to identify what type of education is needed for each.

1. Access the Card Sort on Quizlet by clicking [here](#). You will be taken directly to the "Flashcard" function of Quizlet. Note that Quizlet only allows you to see nine cards without creating an account. To view all 12 cards without an account, click on "Flashcards."
2. Begin by reviewing the flashcards. One card at a time is displayed in the middle of the page. When you click on this card ("Bachelor's Degree - 4 Year"), it flips over to reveal a career that requires this degree of education. Navigate through the twelve cards using the "View Next Card" arrow beneath the card. Familiarize yourself with the education required for different careers.
3. Next, select "Learn" on the left side of the screen, found under "Study." Read about each career and select the type of postsecondary education you think is required for it: Associate Degree (2-year), Bachelor's Degree (4-year), or Certificate (Career Tech). Quizlet notifies you whether each of your answers is correct or incorrect, as well as keeping track of the cards you're familiar with and the cards you've mastered on the left side of the screen. When you're ready to move on, select "Back" on the left toolbar.
4. Now you're ready to play! Select "Match" underneath "Play" on the left side of the screen. Match each career with its education requirement. You are on the clock, so work fast to get on the leader board with other students! You can play as many times as you'd like.



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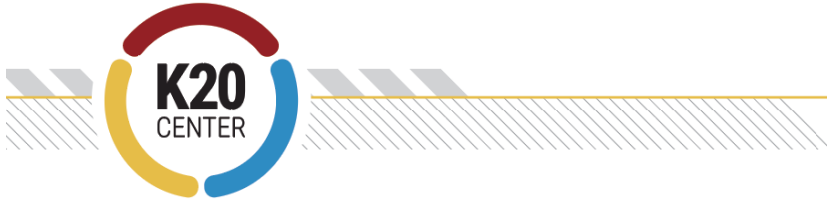
